Safety Corner: Summer Safety for Parents and Guardians

Summer brings different schedules and routines for children. Here are some tips to make their time safer. Be sure to go over the rules about whose homes your children may visit when you're not there and discuss the boundaries of where they may and may not go in the neighborhood. Make sure children know their full names, address, and telephone numbers and how to use the telephone. Be sure they know what to do in case of an emergency and how to reach you using cellular or pager numbers. Children should have a neighbor or trusted adult they may call if they're scared or there's an emergency. Caution children to keep the door locked and not to open the door or talk to anyone who comes to the door when they are home alone. If you have arranged for a family friend or relative to stop by, make sure your children feel comfortable being alone with that person. Make certain they understand not to tell anyone who calls they are home alone. Don't drop your children off at malls, movies, video arcades, or parks. These are not safe places for children to be alone. Make certain a responsible adult supervises your younger children at all times when they are outside and away from home. Teach your children in whose vehicle they may ride. Children should be cautioned to never approach any vehicle, occupied or not, unless accompanied by a parent, guardian, or other trusted adult. Make sure your children know to stay away from pools, canals, or other bodies of water without adult supervision. Since daylight lasts longer during the summer months, be sure your children know their curfew and to check in with you if they are going to be late. If you allow your children to play outside after dark, make sure they wear reflective clothing and stay close to home. Always listen to your children and keep the lines of communication open. Your children are your best source for determining if everything is okay. Teach your children to get out of dangerous or uncomfortable situations right away and practice basic safety skills with them. Make sure they know they are able to tell you about anything that makes them feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused.

Update from Renovation Committee

The Renovation committee has been meeting regularly for the past year. During that time, open meetings were held with interested parishioners to determine what improvements people might like to see and what concerns people had. From the list of items generated at those meetings, priority was given to sealing the building making sure that the exterior of the building is in good condition. Then, the committee interviewed three possible architects with whom we might work. The selection of an architect is near completion. Once the firm is in place, the architect will want to consult with a broad base of the parish to further gather input from its members. One of the ways in which people develop a sense of belonging is by becoming involved and working with others on a common project. The more people who volunteer, the less cumbersome responsibility becomes for any one or few people. And, the more involved, the broader the base of the community and sense of belonging. Throughout the year, we offer a variety of social activities oriented towards providing an opportunity to parishioners across the spectrum of ages and interests to come together in a social context to simply get to know and enjoy one another's companionship. Within these activities, there is a certain amount of planning, advertising, setting up, overseeing, and cleaning up that needs to be done. Ideally, we try to get different people to take responsibility for the different events. If enough people volunteer, no one gets worn out.
